Camera Overview

THE BODY AT A GLANCE



Most cameras arrange controls in similar places. Your model may look different, but the main ideas stay the same.

Top Controls

THE BUTTONS YOU WILL USE FIRST

1

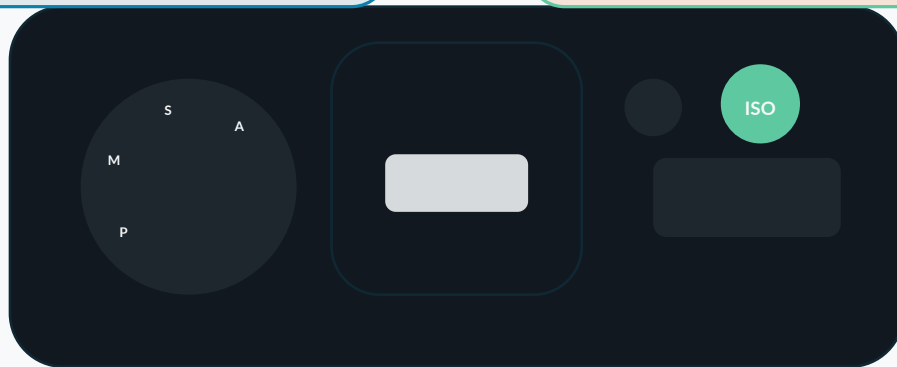
Mode Dial

Chooses how much control you want. Start with Aperture Priority or Shutter Priority before moving to Manual.

2

Shutter Button

Half-press to focus. Full press to take the photo.



3

Command Dial

Changes settings quickly, such as aperture, shutter speed, or menu choices.

4

ISO Button

Controls light sensitivity. Lower ISO is cleaner. Higher ISO helps in darker light.

Beginner Tip

Start in Aperture Priority when you want to learn faster without feeling overwhelmed.

Back Controls

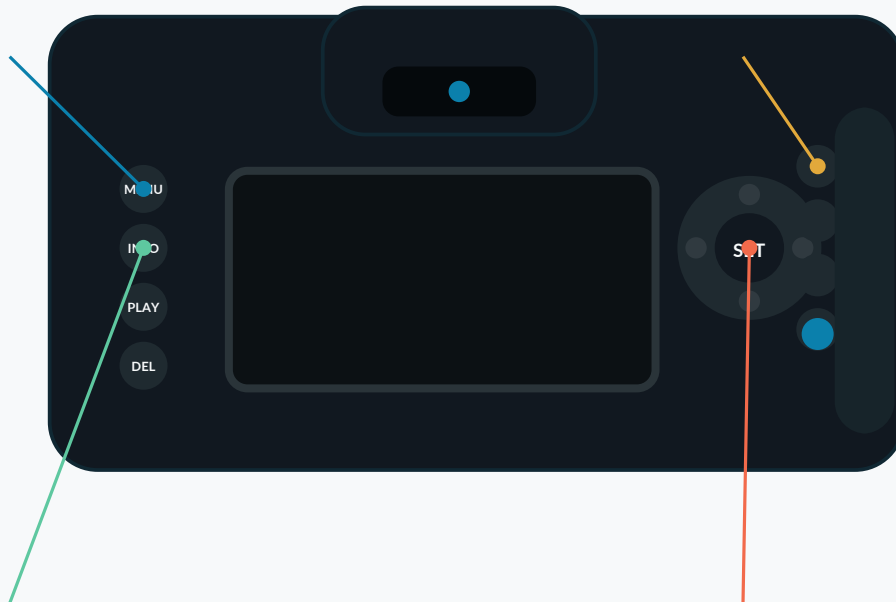
FOCUS, REVIEW, AND ADJUST

Menu Button

Opens the full settings menu.

Exposure Compensation

Makes photos brighter or darker.



Playback

Lets you review photos on the screen.

Focus Point

Chooses exactly where the camera focuses.

Focus Tip

For portraits, place the focus point on the eye closest to the camera.

Quick-Start Cheat Sheet

SIMPLE STARTING POINTS

Everyday Photos

Mode: Aperture Priority
Aperture: f/4 to f/5.6
ISO: Auto or 400
Focus: Single autofocus

Portraits

Mode: Aperture Priority
Aperture: f/1.8 to f/4
Focus: Place the focus point on the eye

Sports

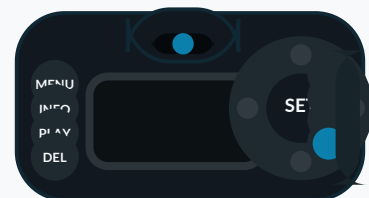
Mode: Shutter Priority
Shutter Speed: 1/500 or faster
Focus: Continuous autofocus
Drive Mode: Burst

Landscapes

Mode: Aperture Priority
Aperture: f/8 to f/11
ISO: 100
Drive Mode: Single shot or self-timer

Remember

- Half-press to focus.
- Use playback to check sharpness.
- Use exposure compensation to brighten or darken a photo.



Beginner Checklist

BEFORE YOU START SHOOTING



Battery is charged



Drive mode is correct



Memory card is inserted



White balance looks natural



Lens is clean



Exposure looks right



Mode dial is set



Focus point is where you want it



ISO is reasonable



Test photo reviewed



Focus mode matches the subject



Extra battery and card packed

Debbie Photos Reminder

A quick test photo can save an entire session. Check focus, exposure, and background before the moment is gone.

Final Tips

HOW TO BUILD CAMERA CONFIDENCE

01

Learn one control at a time

Choose one button, practice with it, and notice what changes.

02

Use your playback screen wisely

Zoom in to check sharpness, but do not delete too quickly.

03

Watch the light

Good light makes every camera easier to use.

04

Practice with intention

Take test photos of the same scene while changing one setting at a time.

05

Keep your camera close

The more often you pick it up, the faster the buttons become familiar.

Your next photo does not need to be perfect.

It only needs to teach you something. That is how every photographer grows.

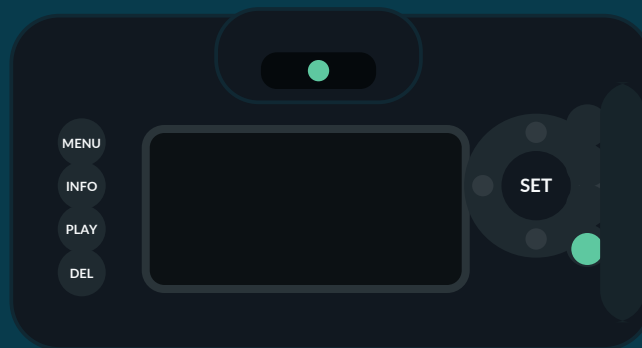
